Top 10 research priorities for learning disabilities. The Royal College of Speech and Language Therapists (RCSLT) have recently launched the 'top 10 priorities' for speech and language therapy and learning disabilities. These priorities have been developed collaboratively with service users, families, carers and other professionals. Social Work capabilities statement The British Association of Social Workers launched a capabilities statement that explains all the things a social worker needs to be able to do to support people with learning disabilities. This is the first such statement, and is paired with a continuing professional development pathway for social workers working with people with learning disabilities.

Children and Families service sets up outreach service Autism Together's Children and Families service are now able to provide autism-specific support to families with children under 18 in their own homes. The new outreach support packages are designed to give parents and carers a little 'me time'; the opportunity for a night out or a shopping trip or even a bit of extra support during the school holidays for working parents. The support packages are entirely based on the needs of the young person involved.

Cochrane Review

Social skills training for attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) in children aged 5 to 18 years. This updated Cochrane review assessed the effects of social skills straining in children and adolescents with ADHD. The reviewers concluded that there is little evidence to support or refute social skills training for children and adolescents with ADHD. The evidence base regarding adolescents is especially weak.

Reducing the Need for Restraint and Restrictive Intervention This guidance is for health services, social care services and special education settings. It sets out how to support children and young people with learning disabilities, autistic spectrum conditions and mental health difficulties who are at risk of restrictive intervention.
