Systematic Review

NICE

Non-pharmacological interventions for stuttering in children six years and younger

This systematic review indicates that the Lidcombe Program may result in lower stuttering frequency and higher speech efficiency than a wait-list control group in children aged up to six years at post-test. However, these results should be interpreted with caution due to the very low and moderate certainty of the evidence and the high risk of bias identified in the included studies.

Studies

Self-testing for HIV could increase diagnoses in the trans community

Kits for HIV self-testing are an effective and acceptable way of increasing HIV testing among trans people. Existing HIV testing services are often designed around men who have sex with men. This can create barriers for trans men and trans women, who are at high risk of HIV. Many go undiagnosed as a result.

A standing frame allows people with severe multiple sclerosis to enjoy a sense of normality

The Standing Up in Multiple Sclerosis (SUMS) trial was set up to find out whether people with severe MS would benefit from using a standing frame at home to stand up for longer periods. Results showed that regular frame standing slightly improved motor function, and was feasible and cost-effective for the NHS to implement.

<u>Even low doses of steroids increase the risk of cardiovascular disease in people with inflammatory diseases</u> People who take steroids to treat long-term inflammatory diseases such as rheumatoid arthritis or inflammatory bowel disease have an increased risk of heart disease, stroke, and other cardiovascular disease. New research found that the risk of cardiovascular disease increases with the dose and duration of steroid treatment. A surprising finding was that even low daily doses increase the risk.
