Annual health checks lower risk of death

Health checks for people with learning disabilities reduce risk of death, study finds. A <u>study</u>, published in BMJ Open, therefore set out to discover whether having a health check could lead to better survival and lower rates of mortality.

Autistic mothers need better breastfeeding support

Accessibility measures should be urgently introduced into infant feeding services to support autistic women to meet their breastfeeding goals, according to new research.

Older adults and psychotropic medication

Study published in <u>Journal of Applied Research in Intellectual Disabilities</u> looked at why psychotropic medication is frequently administered to people with intellectual disability with mental health and/or behavioural problems, instead of other non-pharmacological interventions.

Disability pay gaps in the UK

In 2021, disabled employees with autism had the largest pay gap to non-disabled people with no long-lasting health conditions, with their median pay being 33.5% less. Those with severe or specific learning difficulties (29.7% less), epilepsy (25.4% less), or mental illness or other nervous disorders (22.1%), also had a large pay gap to non-disabled employees with no long-lasting health conditions. Report

New report reveals extent of crisis facing social care

One of the most significant challenges facing the learning disability care sector is a lack of staff, with the report revealing that at any one time, 16% of workforce positions were vacant.

'Disability Passport' to improve access to leisure centres

The Down Syndrome Bill is set to become law after clearing its final parliamentary hurdle, passing its Third Reading in the House of Lords.

<u>SEND parents and their right to mediation</u>

Parents and young people could be receiving inaccurate information about their right to mediation when bringing an appeal to the special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) Tribunal, according to IPSEA.

Calls for a new law to better protect autistic young people

The mother of an autistic girl who died in an inpatient facility earlier this year is campaigning for a new law that would ensure better care and protection for young people with autism and/or mental health problems.

Learning disability training rolled out to NHS Wales staff

The training is designed to improve knowledge and raise awareness of the issues that people with a learning disability face when accessing healthcare services.

<u>Autistic people are six times more likely to attempt suicide – poor mental health support may be</u> to blame

One person dies by suicide every 40 seconds. Some of those most at risk include people experiencing mental health difficulties (such as depression) and vulnerable groups who experience discrimination (such as LGBTQ+ people).

Teenager in NHS hospital subjected to brutal restraint

A deprivation of liberty case involving a vulnerable 14-year old with autism and a learning disability has been called "shocking" by a judge.
