Nicotine receptor partial agonists for smoking cessation

Nicotine receptor partial agonists may help people to stop smoking by a combination of maintaining moderate levels of dopamine to counteract withdrawal symptoms (acting as an agonist) and reducing smoking satisfaction (acting as an antagonist). This is an update of a Cochrane Review first published in 2007.

Non-clinical support for patients waiting for mental health treatment

The Waiting List Initiative was a programme co-created by Everyturn Mental Health and two community treatment teams (CTTs) at Cumbria, Northumberland, Tyne and Wear (CNTW) NHS Trust. The initiative gave three-to-six months of non-clinical, emotional, and practical support to people with serious mental illness who were waiting for clinical treatment from the CTTs. This service helped to manage the increased demand on the CTTs, reduce their waiting lists, and ultimately improved mental health and wellbeing outcomes for patients.
