What does receiving autism diagnosis in adulthood look like? Stakeholders' experiences and inputs

The age of diagnosis is crucial for optimal health outcomes; however, some individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) may not be diagnosed until adulthood. Limited information is available about the lived experience of receiving a diagnosis during adulthood. Thus, we aimed to investigate stakeholders' experiences about the ASD diagnosis during adulthood.

Resilience in the face of adversity: How people with intellectual disabilities deal with challenging times

In the current study, applying a guided photovoice procedure, people with intellectual disabilities were asked what helped them to deal with adverse events. Additionally, informants from their social network were asked to reflect on this question.

Examining a model of anxiety in autistic adults

Anxiety disorders commonly occur in autism. Existing studies implicate intolerance of uncertainty, alexithymia, sensory processing differences and emotion regulation difficulties as influencing factors of anxiety in autism. To date, a few studies have considered the combination of these factors within the same sample.

<u>Understanding the menopausal experiences of women with intellectual disabilities: A scoping</u> review

Globally, the available literature on women with intellectual disabilities and menopause focuses on providing medical insights into onset and symptoms and little attention has been paid to documenting how menopause affects women themselves. This represents a significant gap in understanding how women understand this change in life and has been a key justification for the need for this research.

<u>Assessing Autism in Deaf/Hard-of-Hearing Youths: Interdisciplinary Teams, COVID Considerations,</u> and Future Directions

Autism spectrum disorders are more prevalent in children who are Deaf or Hard of Hearing (D/HH) than in the general population. This potential for diagnostic overlap underscores the importance of understanding the best approaches for assessing autism spectrum disorder in D/HH youths. Despite the recognition of clinical significance, youths who are D/HH are often identified as autistic later than individuals with normal hearing, which results in delayed access to appropriate early intervention services.

New toolkit: making financial decisions for young people who lack capacity

The Ministry of Justice has developed a new toolkit which aims to help parents and carers make financial decisions for young people who lack capacity.

The <u>toolkit</u> explains what lacking mental capacity means (and the difference between lacking mental capacity and fluctuating capacity), as well as the five principles of the Mental Capacity Act (MCA).

Number of autistic people in mental health hospitals: latest data

The latest monthly <u>Assuring Transformation NHS Digital data</u> shows that in May 2023:

- In total 2,045 autistic people and people with learning disabilities are in inpatient mental health hospitals in England
- 1,320 (65%) of these people are autistic
- There are 230 under 18s in inpatient units that are autistic or have a learning disability. Of these, 96% are autistic.
