Risk of premature birth 50 per cent higher in mothers with poor mental health, large-scale study shows

A new NIHR funded research from led by researchers at King's College London, the University of Exeter, the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine and the University of Liverpool has found that women who had had at least one contact with mental health services in the seven years prior to their pregnancy were at increased risk of preterm birth.

Narrowing the disadvantage gap: How home learning and self-regulation in the early years shape school attainment

A new study has found a clear links between low socioeconomic status (SES), the quality of the pre-school home learning environment, the ability of children to self-regulate and academic attainment in English and maths.

Gypsy traveller group faced a higher risk during the covid-19 pandemic

New research shows, for the first time, a higher risk of COVID-19 hospitalisation or death for the White Gypsy/Traveller ethnic minority group. The research, which looked at over 4.3m people in Scotland, was led by the MRC/CSO Social and Public Health Sciences Unit at the University of Glasgow and published in the Journal of Epidemiology & Community Health. The study also found a higher risk of hospitalisation and death for Pakistani and African people when compared with the White Scottish group.

Mapping early years practice in England: results from our pilot

The aim of this pilot study was to better understand the factors that affect different levels of progress among children eligible for free school meals in the early years, especially those influenced by local public services.

COVID boosters to be sold on the high street – here's what effect this may have on uptake

COVID boosters will be available to buy from high-street pharmacists and private healthcare providers across the UK in 2024. The news comes just weeks after the UK government announced that free boosters would only be available on the NHS for over-65s this autumn.

How tracking menopause symptoms can give women more control over their health

Menopause can cause more symptoms than hot flushes alone. And some of your symptoms and reactions might be due to the menopause, even if you are still having periods. Research shows that keeping track of those symptoms can help to alleviate them.

















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<u>Common heart medication less effective in south Asian people – new research</u>

People who have recently had a heart attack are often prescribed clopidogrel, a medication that decreases the risk of having another heart attack. While the drug is very effective at preventing subsequent heart attacks, it can only work if it's activated by the body's CYP2C19 enzyme. Certain genetic variations mean the body can't activate clopidogrel, because it can't make this enzyme.
